Line Length

Line length does not exceed 35 characters with no hyphenation breaks at the end of a line.

Paragraphs

Paragraphs beyond 11 lines were divided into small text blocks. If a paragraph normally extended beyond 11 lines, a dash was inserted in between blocks of text to note the paragraph continues.

This Bible uses 11-point type and black-letter text to ensure readability.

No footnotes or callouts were included in this Bible to avoid an overly complicated text.

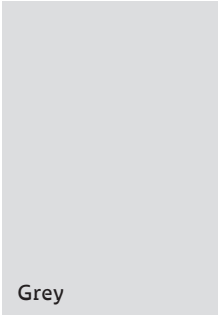
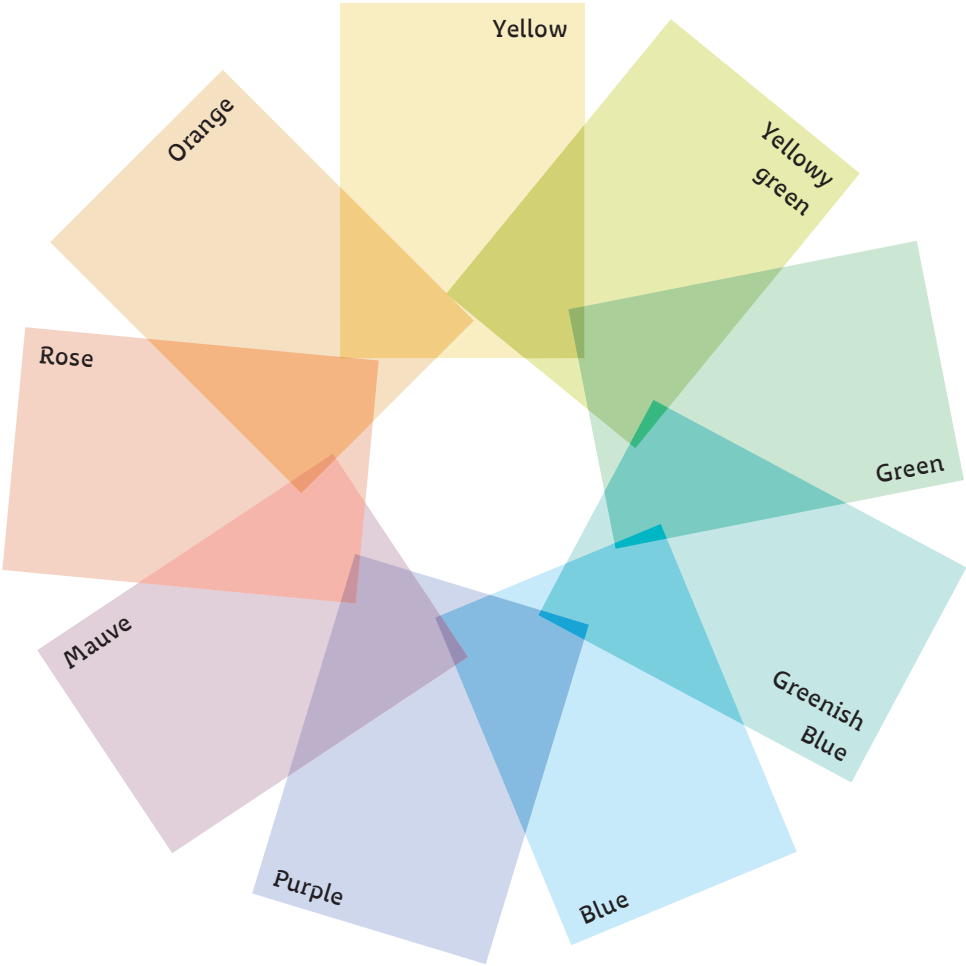

INTRODUCING COLORED OVERLAYS

A colored overlay can reduce the visual stress (visual distortions and discomfort) that some people experience when they read. The effective color differs from one person to another.

—

This pack of overlays has been designed so that there is a sufficient choice of color to accommodate the differences between people. The nine differently colored overlays can be used singly or in pairs one on top of another. Eighteen shades of color are available.

Visual stress is poorly understood but is thought to arise when nerve cells in the visual part of the brain are overactive.¹ The effect of an overlay can sometimes be life-changing: "Sam was overdue an eye examination, so I booked him in with opticians new to us. I told them Sam was dyslexic, and they offered a colored overlay test. Two weeks before his fourteenth birthday, Sam

saw text on the whole page for the very first time. I have never seen a child so excited. He couldn't speak. It took his breath away. He said, "Mum, is that what you see when you read? No wonder you can read so fast."

—

Sam brought the overlays home . . . He kept wandering into the room, looking at them, playing with them, on and off the book, saying, "I can't believe they do that" and shaking his head. We couldn't see it, the magic only worked for him. " ²

Many individuals who use colored overlays find tinted spectacles easier to use. Note that the best overlay color is not usually the same as the best color in tinted spectacles.

HOW TO TEST WITH OVERLAYS

Obtain a description of any symptoms from reading.

Begin with the general question:
"After you have been reading for a time, do the letters or words do anything strange?"

If necessary, use the following questions:

- Do the letters move, wobble, change places, fade or darken?
- Do you see shadows in the text?
- Does it hurt your eyes to look at the text?

Use the descriptions obtained above to refer to the distortion/discomfort when comparing overlays.



SINGLE OVERLAYS

1. Place two colored overlays side by side on a page of text.
2. Which of the two sides is clearest and most comfortable?
(Comfort is more important than clarity.)
3. Leave the better overlay in place and replace the other overlay with another color.
4. Repeat this until the best color has been chosen by trial and error.



DOUBLE OVERLAYS

If distortions remain with the chosen overlay, try a stronger color using two overlays, one on top of the other. It does not matter much which one goes on top.

You only need to choose similar colours. So if your chosen color was purple you would choose blue and purple, and purple and mauve. Choose your double overlays from the following list.

List of double overlays

- rose and orange
- orange and yellow
- yellow and yellowy green
- yellowy green and green
- green and greenish blue
- greenish blue and blue
- blue and purple
- purple and mauve
- mauve and rose

1. Position the chosen overlay to cover the entire page.
2. Then select another overlay from the list above and place it over half the page.
3. Compare the two sides as before.



GENESIS

The Creation

1 In the beginning God created the heavens and the earth.

² Now the earth was formless and empty, darkness covered the surface of the watery depths, and the Spirit of God was hovering over the surface of the waters. ³ Then God said, "Let there be light," and there was light.

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⁴ God saw that the light was good, and God separated the light from the darkness. ⁵ God called the light "day," and the darkness he called "night." There was an evening, and there was a morning: one day.

⁶ Then God said, "Let there be an expanse between the waters, separating water from water."

⁷ So God made the expanse and separated the water under the expanse from the water above the expanse. And it was so. ⁸ God called the expanse "sky." Evening came and then morning: the second day.

⁹ Then God said, "Let the water under the sky be gathered into one place, and let the dry land appear." And it was so. ¹⁰ God called the dry land "earth," and the gathering of the water he called "seas." And God saw that it was good.

—

¹¹ Then God said, "Let the earth produce vegetation: seed-bearing plants and fruit trees on the earth bearing fruit with seed in it according to their kinds." And it was so.

¹² The earth produced vegetation: seed-bearing plants according to their kinds and trees bearing fruit with seed in it according to their kinds. And God saw that it was good.

¹³ Evening came and then morning: the third day.

¹⁴ Then God said, "Let there be lights in the expanse of the sky to separate the day from the night. They will serve as signs for seasons and for days and years. ¹⁵ They will be lights in the expanse of the sky to provide light on the earth." And it was so.

—

¹⁶ God made the two great lights — the greater light to rule over the day and the lesser light to rule over the night — as well as the stars.

¹⁷ God placed them in the expanse of the sky to provide light on the earth, ¹⁸ to rule the day and the night, and to separate light from darkness. And God saw that it was good.

¹⁹ Evening came and then morning: the fourth day.

²⁰ Then God said, "Let the water swarm with living creatures, and let birds fly above the earth across the expanse of the sky." ²¹ So God created the large sea-creatures and every living creature that moves and swarms in the water, according to their kinds. He also created every winged creature according to its kind. And God saw that it was good.

—

²² God blessed them: "Be fruitful, multiply, and fill the waters of the

seas, and let the birds multiply on the earth.” ²³Evening came and then morning: the fifth day.

²⁴Then God said, “Let the earth produce living creatures according to their kinds: livestock, creatures that crawl, and the wildlife of the earth according to their kinds.” And it was so.

—
²⁵So God made the wildlife of the earth according to their kinds, the livestock according to their kinds, and all the creatures that crawl on the ground according to their kinds. And God saw that it was good.

²⁶Then God said, “Let us make man in our image, according to our likeness. They will rule the fish of the sea, the birds of the sky, the livestock, the whole earth, and the creatures that crawl on the earth.”

—
²⁷ So God created man
in his own image;
he created him in the image
of God;
he created them male
and female.

—
²⁸God blessed them, and God said to them, “Be fruitful, multiply, fill the earth, and subdue it. Rule the fish of the sea, the birds of the sky, and every creature that crawls on the earth.”

—
²⁹God also said, “Look, I have given you every seed-bearing plant on the surface of the entire earth and every tree whose fruit contains seed. This will be food for you, ³⁰for all the wildlife of the earth, for every bird

of the sky, and for every creature that crawls on the earth — everything having the breath of life in it — I have given every green plant for food.” And it was so. ³¹God saw all that he had made, and it was very good indeed. Evening came and then morning: the sixth day.

2 So the heavens and the earth and everything in them were completed. ²On the seventh day God had completed his work that he had done, and he rested on the seventh day from all his work that he had done. ³God blessed the seventh day and declared it holy, for on it he rested from all his work of creation.

Man and Woman in the Garden

⁴These are the records of the heavens and the earth, concerning their creation. At the time that the LORD God made the earth and the heavens, ⁵no shrub of the field had yet grown on the land, and no plant of the field had yet sprouted, for the LORD God had not made it rain on the land, and there was no man to work the ground.

—
⁶But mist would come up from the earth and water all the ground.

⁸The LORD God planted a garden in Eden, in the east, and there he placed the man he had formed.

⁹The LORD God caused to grow out of the ground every tree pleasing

in appearance and good for food, including the tree of life in the middle of the garden, as well as the tree of the knowledge of good and evil.

¹⁰ A river went out from Eden to water the garden. From there it divided and became the source of four rivers. ¹¹ The name of the first is Pishon, which flows through the entire land of Havilah, where there is gold.

—

¹² Gold from that land is pure; bdellium and onyx are also there.

¹³ The name of the second river is Gihon, which flows through the entire land of Cush. ¹⁴ The name of the third river is Tigris, which runs east of Assyria. And the fourth river is the Euphrates.

¹⁵ The LORD God took the man and placed him in the garden of Eden to work it and watch over it. ¹⁶ And the LORD God commanded the man, "You are free to eat from any tree of the garden,

—

¹⁷ but you must not eat from the tree of the knowledge of good and evil, for on the day you eat from it, you will certainly die." ¹⁸ Then the LORD God said, "It is not good for the man to be alone. I will make a helper corresponding to him."

—

¹⁹ The LORD God formed out of the ground every wild animal and every bird of the sky, and brought each to the man to see what he would call it. And whatever the man called a living creature, that was its name. ²⁰ The man gave names to all the livestock, to the birds of the sky, and

to every wild animal; but for the man no helper was found corresponding to him. ²¹ So the LORD God caused a deep sleep to come over the man, and he slept. God took one of his ribs and closed the flesh at that place.

—

²² Then the LORD God made the rib he had taken from the man into a woman and brought her to the man.

²³ And the man said:

—

This one, at last, is bone
of my bone
and flesh of my flesh;
this one will be called "woman,"
for she was taken from man.

²⁴ This is why a man leaves his father and mother and bonds with his wife, and they become one flesh. ²⁵ Both the man and his wife were naked, yet felt no shame.

The Temptation and the Fall

3 Now the serpent was the most cunning of all the wild animals that the LORD God had made. He said to the woman, "Did God really say, 'You can't eat from any tree in the garden'?"

² The woman said to the serpent, "We may eat the fruit from the trees in the garden. ³ But about the fruit of the tree in the middle of the garden, God said, 'You must not eat it or touch it, or you will die.'"

⁴ "No! You will certainly not die," the serpent said to the woman. ⁵ "In fact, God knows that when you eat it your eyes will be opened and you will be like God, knowing good and evil." ⁶ The woman saw that the tree

was good for food and delightful to look at, and that it was desirable for obtaining wisdom. So she took some of its fruit and ate it; she also gave some to her husband, who was with her, and he ate it. ⁷Then the eyes of both of them were opened, and they knew they were naked; so they sewed fig leaves together and made coverings for themselves.

Sin's Consequences

⁸Then the man and his wife heard the sound of the LORD God walking in the garden at the time of the evening breeze, and they hid from the LORD God among the trees of the garden. ⁹So the LORD God called out to the man and said to him, "Where are you?"

¹⁰And he said, "I heard you in the garden, and I was afraid because I was naked, so I hid."

¹¹Then he asked, "Who told you that you were naked? Did you eat from the tree that I commanded you not to eat from?"

¹²The man replied, "The woman you gave to be with me — she gave me some fruit from the tree, and I ate."

¹³So the LORD God asked the woman, "What have you done?"

And the woman said, "The serpent deceived me, and I ate."

¹⁴So the LORD God said to the serpent:

—
Because you have done this,
you are cursed more than
any livestock

and more than any wild animal.
You will move on your belly
and eat dust all the days
of your life.

¹⁵ I will put hostility between you
and the woman,
and between your offspring
and her offspring.
He will strike your head,
and you will strike his heel.

¹⁶He said to the woman:

—
I will intensify your labor pains;
you will bear children
with painful effort.
Your desire will be
for your husband,
yet he will rule over you.

¹⁷And he said to the man, "Because you listened to your wife and ate from the tree about which I commanded you, 'Do not eat from it':

—
The ground is cursed
because of you.
You will eat from it by means of
painful labor
all the days of your life.

¹⁸ It will produce thorns
and thistles for you,
and you will eat the plants
of the field.

—
¹⁹ You will eat bread by the sweat
of your brow
until you return
to the ground,
since you were taken from it.
For you are dust,
and you will return to dust."

²⁰The man named his wife Eve
because she was the mother of all

the living. ²¹The LORD God made clothing from skins for the man and his wife, and he clothed them.

²²The LORD God said, "Since the man has become like one of us, knowing good and evil, he must not reach out, take from the tree of life, eat, and live forever." ²³So the LORD God sent him away from the garden of Eden to work the ground from which he was taken.

—

²⁴He drove the man out and stationed the cherubim and the flaming, whirling sword east of the garden of Eden to guard the way to the tree of life.

Cain Murders Abel

4 The man was intimate with his wife Eve, and she conceived and gave birth to Cain. She said, "I have had a male child with the LORD's help." ²She also gave birth to his brother Abel. Now Abel became a shepherd of flocks, but Cain worked the ground.

—

³In the course of time Cain presented some of the land's produce as an offering to the LORD.

⁴And Abel also presented an offering — some of the firstborn of his flock and their fat portions. The LORD had regard for Abel and his offering, ⁵but he did not have regard for Cain and his offering. Cain was furious, and he looked despondent.

⁶Then the LORD said to Cain, "Why are you furious? And why do you look despondent? ⁷If you do what is right, won't you be accepted? But if you do not do what is right, sin is

crouching at the door. Its desire is for you, but you must rule over it."

⁸Cain said to his brother Abel, "Let's go out to the field." And while they were in the field, Cain attacked his brother Abel and killed him.

⁹Then the LORD said to Cain, "Where is your brother Abel?"

"I don't know," he replied. "Am I my brother's guardian?"

¹⁰Then he said, "What have you done? Your brother's blood cries out to me from the ground! ¹¹So now you are cursed, alienated from the ground that opened its mouth to receive your brother's blood you have shed.

¹²If you work the ground, it will never again give you its yield. You will be a restless wanderer on the earth."

¹³But Cain answered the LORD, "My punishment is too great to bear!

¹⁴Since you are banishing me today from the face of the earth, and I must hide from your presence and become a restless wanderer on the earth, whoever finds me will kill me."

¹⁵Then the LORD replied to him, "In that case, whoever kills Cain will suffer vengeance seven times over." And he placed a mark on Cain so that whoever found him would not kill him. ¹⁶Then Cain went out from the LORD's presence and lived in the land of Nod, east of Eden.

¹⁷Cain was intimate with his wife, and she conceived and gave birth to Enoch. Then Cain became the builder

JOHN

Prologue

1 In the beginning was the Word, and the Word was with God, and the Word was God. **2** He was with God in the beginning. **3** All things were created through him, and apart from him not one thing was created that has been created. **4** In him was life, and that life was the light of men. **5** That light shines in the darkness, and yet the darkness did not overcome it.

6 There was a man sent from God whose name was John. **7** He came as a witness to testify about the light, so that all might believe through him. **8** He was not the light, but he came to testify about the light. **9** The true light that gives light to everyone was coming into the world.

10 He was in the world, and the world was created through him, and yet the world did not recognize him. **11** He came to his own, and his own people did not receive him. **12** But to all who did receive him, he gave them the right to be children of God, to those who believe in his name, **13** who were born, not of natural descent, or of the will of the flesh, or of the will of man, but of God.

14 The Word became flesh and dwelt among us. We observed his glory, the glory as the one and only Son from the Father, full of grace and truth. **15** (John testified concerning him and exclaimed, "This was the one of whom I said, 'The one coming after

me ranks ahead of me, because he existed before me.'") **16** Indeed, we have all received grace upon grace from his fullness, **17** for the law was given through Moses; grace and truth came through Jesus Christ. **18** No one has ever seen God. The one and only Son, who is himself God and is at the Father's side — he has revealed him.

John the Baptist's Testimony

19 This was John's testimony when the Jews from Jerusalem sent priests and Levites to ask him, "Who are you?"

20 He didn't deny it but confessed, "I am not the Messiah."

21 "What then?" they asked him. "Are you Elijah?"

"I am not," he said.

"Are you the Prophet?"

"No," he answered.

22 "Who are you, then?" they asked. "We need to give an answer to those who sent us. What can you tell us about yourself?"

23 He said, "I am a 'voice of one crying out in the wilderness: Make straight the way of the Lord' — just as Isaiah the prophet said."

24 Now they had been sent from the Pharisees. **25** So they asked him, "Why then do you baptize if you aren't the Messiah, or Elijah, or the Prophet?"

²⁶ "I baptize with water," John answered them. "Someone stands among you, but you don't know him. ²⁷ He is the one coming after me, whose sandal strap I'm not worthy to untie." ²⁸ All this happened in Bethany across the Jordan, where John was baptizing.

The Lamb of God

²⁹ The next day John saw Jesus coming toward him and said, "Look, the Lamb of God, who takes away the sin of the world! ³⁰ This is the one I told you about: 'After me comes a man who ranks ahead of me, because he existed before me.' ³¹ I didn't know him, but I came baptizing with water so that he might be revealed to Israel."

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³² And John testified, "I saw the Spirit descending from heaven like a dove, and he rested on him. ³³ I didn't know him, but he who sent me to baptize with water told me, 'The one you see the Spirit descending and resting on — he is the one who baptizes with the Holy Spirit.' ³⁴ I have seen and testified that this is the Son of God."

³⁵ The next day, John was standing with two of his disciples. ³⁶ When he saw Jesus passing by, he said, "Look, the Lamb of God!"

³⁷ The two disciples heard him say this and followed Jesus. ³⁸ When Jesus turned and noticed them following him, he asked them, "What are you looking for?"

They said to him, "Rabbi" (which means "Teacher"), "where are you staying?"

³⁹ "Come and you'll see," he replied. So they went and saw where he was staying, and they stayed with him that day. It was about four in the afternoon.

⁴⁰ Andrew, Simon Peter's brother, was one of the two who heard John and followed him. ⁴¹ He first found his own brother Simon and told him, "We have found the Messiah" (which is translated "the Christ"), ⁴² and he brought Simon to Jesus.

When Jesus saw him, he said, "You are Simon, son of John. You will be called Cephas" (which is translated "Peter").

Philip and Nathanael

⁴³ The next day Jesus decided to leave for Galilee. He found Philip and told him, "Follow me."

⁴⁴ Now Philip was from Bethsaida, the hometown of Andrew and Peter. ⁴⁵ Philip found Nathanael and told him, "We have found the one Moses wrote about in the law (and so did the prophets): Jesus the son of Joseph, from Nazareth."

⁴⁶ "Can anything good come out of Nazareth?" Nathanael asked him.

"Come and see," Philip answered.

⁴⁷ Then Jesus saw Nathanael coming toward him and said about him, "Here truly is an Israelite in whom there is no deceit."

⁴⁸ "How do you know me?" Nathanael asked.

"Before Philip called you, when you were under the fig tree, I saw you," Jesus answered.

⁴⁹"Rabbi," Nathanael replied, "You are the Son of God; you are the King of Israel!"

⁵⁰Jesus responded to him, "Do you believe because I told you I saw you under the fig tree? You will see greater things than this." ⁵¹Then he said, "Truly I tell you, you will see heaven opened and the angels of God ascending and descending on the Son of Man."

The First Sign: Turning Water into Wine

2 On the third day a wedding took place in Cana of Galilee. Jesus's mother was there, ²and Jesus and his disciples were invited to the wedding as well. ³When the wine ran out, Jesus's mother told him, "They don't have any wine."

⁴"What has this concern of yours to do with me, woman?" Jesus asked. "My hour has not yet come."

⁵"Do whatever he tells you," his mother told the servants.

⁶Now six stone water jars had been set there for Jewish purification. Each contained twenty or thirty gallons.

⁷"Fill the jars with water," Jesus told them. So they filled them to the brim. ⁸Then he said to them, "Now draw some out and take it to the headwaiter." And they did.

⁹When the headwaiter tasted the water (after it had become wine), he did not know where it came from — though the servants who had drawn the water knew. He called the groom ¹⁰and told him, "Everyone sets out the fine wine first, then, after people are drunk, the inferior. But you have kept the fine wine until now."

¹¹Jesus did this, the first of his signs, in Cana of Galilee. He revealed his glory, and his disciples believed in him.

¹²After this, he went down to Capernaum, together with his mother, his brothers, and his disciples, and they stayed there only a few days.

Cleansing the Temple

¹³The Jewish Passover was near, and so Jesus went up to Jerusalem. ¹⁴In the temple he found people selling oxen, sheep, and doves, and he also found the money changers sitting there.

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¹⁵After making a whip out of cords, he drove everyone out of the temple with their sheep and oxen. He also poured out the money changers' coins and overturned the tables.

¹⁶He told those who were selling doves, "Get these things out of here! Stop turning my Father's house into a marketplace!"

¹⁷And his disciples remembered that it is written: "Zeal for your house will consume me."

¹⁸So the Jews replied to him, "What sign will you show us for doing these things?"

ABBA (AB-buh, AH-buh)

Name for God that Jesus used.

Means daddy. Mark 14:36.

AMEN (ah-MEN)

Word that means "so be it." Often used at the end of prayer. Psalm 106:48.

ANOINT

To pour oil or perfume on someone to show he is being set apart for a special purpose. 1 Samuel 16:12–13.

ARK

Large boat God told Noah to build. God was sad when he saw the great evil people were planning and doing on earth. Only Noah and his family pleased God, so God decided to destroy those who were doing evil. The ark was designed to save Noah's family and representatives of each kind of animal on earth.

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God gave Noah specific instructions about how the ark would be built: 450 feet long, 75 feet wide, and 45 feet high. The ark had one door and three floors filled with rooms. It was built of gopher wood, a kind of cypress, and covered with pitch. Genesis 6:9–22; Hebrews 11:7; 1 Peter 3:20; 2 Peter 2:5.

ARK OF THE COVENANT

Wooden box covered in gold that contained the stone tablets on which the Ten Commandments were written, a jar of manna, and Aaron's staff that budded. Hebrews 9:3–4.

BAPTIZE

To lower someone in the water and bring him back up. The person who is baptized is following Jesus's example by showing others that he has confessed Jesus as Savior and Lord. Matthew 3:13–17.

BETHLEHEM (BETH-lih-hem)

Means "house of bread." Near Jerusalem, this town is where Ruth and Boaz lived, where David was anointed king, and where Jesus was born. Ruth 1:22; 1 Samuel 16:1–13; Micah 5:2; Luke 2:4.

BURIAL

In Bible times, the Jews buried their dead as soon as possible, usually within twenty-four hours of death. Bodies were buried in caves, tombs cut from rock, or in the ground. Jesus was buried in a tomb before sundown on the day he died. Matthew 27:57–61.

CANAAN (KAY-nuhn)

Large area of land that God promised to Abram and his descendants. Canaan lay between the Mediterranean Sea and the Jordan River reaching from the brook of Egypt to the area around Ugarit in Syria or to the Euphrates River.

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The word Canaan referred to different geographical areas at different times. Whatever the land was called, it was extremely important as the land bridge between Mesopotamia and Egypt
